This 1960 Class Newsletter is an attempt to keep in contact with our classmates and update their happenings in life.

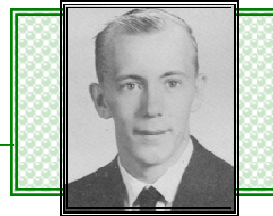
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Hello Dewey,

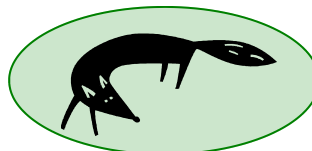

I was employed as supervisor at Century in Hickory for eleven years. Then was self employed for the rest of my working years, working in a shop behind my house. I have enjoyed working with wood and making things for industry and the public. I have made many sofas, chairs, recliners, gun cases, gun stocks, clocks and cabinets. A shop behind my home may not seem much to some, but the Lord knew me and what was about to happen. All at once with no warning my back gave way and my legs became paralyzed. Doctors at Charlotte said no way I would walk again. What they didn't know was that many were praying for me. When doctors operated they found I had bone deterioration. My bottom vertebra crumbled and my spinal cord was nearly severed when my back fell down on my pelvis. This was in September 1987. I was put in a body cast and to bed for six months. Having to stay in bed relying on my wife for six months was a hard challenge. Eight bolts were put in my back and two bolts on metal plate connect my back to my pelvis. I said at first that the Lord knew me and what was about to happen to me. While I was confined to the bed and house, the men I had working for me ran the business. The Lord will take care of his children. Today I get around as good as I ever did. I just have to be careful. I give praise to the Lord for all of this.

Church has been a big part of my life. I attend Solid Rock Baptist. I am a deacon, a Sunday school teacher, lead the singing, and have been a choir director for forty six years.

Retiring in 2004, I have not worked since. My hobbies are traveling, fishing, and grandchildren. My wife and I have been to all but four states. I enjoy fishing and have been to Old Mexico four times fishing many lakes from Virginia to Florida. I enjoy being on the water, the challenge and competition of bass fishing.

The saddest day in my life was June 20, 2008 .I followed my Mother's casket to the cemetery. My Fathers health is declining fast. I can truthfully say I am thankful for Godly parents.

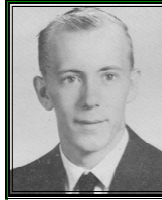
"50" Year Celebration
