

CONTINUED HAPPENINGS AND MESSAGES FROM CLASSMATES OF 1960

Jack Allen BURLESON

Many of you may remember Jack. He apparently quit school when he turned sixteen as many did in that day. His picture did not appear in the "Freshman Annual." At the young age of eighteen he was shot in the head by another person. It was truly a situation of him "being in the wrong place at the wrong time." The date of Jack's death was February 20, 1960, the year of our graduation. He was born April 06, 1941. His body is buried in the Burleson Family Cemetery in Avery County outside of Newland on Spanish Oak Road. Inez ROSS Carswell Ledbetter

I found that another of our classmates had died and you may remember her; Inez Ross. I knew that she lived in Glen Alpine and after thinking about her I remembered Clyde Ross, which I was friends of for a time while in school. As a matter of fact, I took over his early morning bicycle paper route through the streets of Glen Alpine. Kids don't do that type of thing anymore. It's a different world nowadays.

I called Clyde and he advised me that Inez was his sister; I had forgotten. Clyde said that Inez died of cancer October 27, 2000, and was born November 23, 1941. I don't know if she quit school or not but her picture did not show up in the Annual after her Sophomore Year. Inez was originally married to Jimmy Carswell and he died. They had two girls. She later married Claude Ledbetter and lived in McDowell County when she died. She is buried in the cemetery of the Freedom Missionary Baptist Church in McDowell County.

Betty Jean TURNER—I understand that Betty Jean died at a very young age. I have searched the cemetery books for Burke County and checked for a Death Certificate at the court house and have not found one with the name Betty Jean Turner. She may have married and her last name may have changed. Does anyone out there know anything about Betty? If so, let me know. **SEE UPDATE BELOW**

Shirley SISK—As most of us may know Shirley Sisk was apparently beaten to death when she was 30 years old. I have now posted a copy of the actual News Herald account of the death and obituary on the internet as well as her "Death Certificate." Betty Jean TURNER Sisk—After much searching I have finally gotten the information on the death of our classmate Betty Jean. Every night or so I would go home and tell my wife that I was closing in on the mystery of Betty Jean Turner and last night I told her that tomorrow (12/15/2004) will be the day and it was. I found out that she was married and had changed her name to Sisk, but was divorced according to her "Certificate of Death." She was born August 16, 1942 and died October 13, 1965 at the young age of 23. She is buried in the Pleasant Ridge Baptist Church Graveyard on Conley Road. No churches had air conditioning, heat and not many song books. The floors in all the churches we visited were concrete and the pews were hand-me-downs or made out of regular wood. —Some with no cushions. It's amazing how the Mexicans make-do with what they have and are very appreciative of what you give or do for them. Most have the old traditional "outhouse" as I was used to when growing up. In spite of their living conditions, they are very clean people.




“Ten Signs You are Getting Old”
